Since then, our winning student was presented with his chapter and state awards in June, and his poster was taken to the 116th National Congress in Dallas in July and entered into the National competition. I'm happy to report that the poster was awarded second place in the National competition, and I have been told that it was a close contest. Our student will receive the National prize this month at an assembly at his school. For our chapter to receive both a first and a second place National award in two years is quite an accomplishment. I hope that our record of successful entries will provide an incentive for our members to go out into their community schools and promote the contest for next year with the fourth and fifth grade history teachers. We held a Ben Franklin Opportunity Drawing, with many fine prizes donated by the attendees – there were enough so that no one went home without something.

Our Executive Board meeting will be held immediately following the Chapter meeting, and all members are welcome to attend. I will soon begin preparing agendas for the Membership or Board meetings. If you have any items which you would like to have included, please let me know by September 7. During the summer break, I have been arranging for interesting programs for our Fall meetings. I have lined up an interesting program for the October meeting, and have a couple of good possibilities to choose from for November. SEPTEMBER SPEAKER

Commander C. R. "Chuck" Lampman, USN Ret.

Commander Lampman was born and spent his early years in the Hudson River Valley of New York. Frequent trips with family and relatives to places such as Fort Ticonderoga, Crown Point, and the Saratoga Battlefield gave him an early appreciation for history and the events of the American Revolution.

Chuck has done extensive in-depth research since 1993 at various educational institutions and at actual Revolutionary War sites, both in the North and South.

He is a retired Navy Commander, Past President and National Trustee of the California Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, and Past Vice-President General of the Western District covering California, Nevada, and Hawaii. He is the past National Society General Chairman of all of the Committees under the direction of the Historian General. Currently he is the NSSAR Color Guard Commander.

He has been recognized by the California Legislature and the Houses of Representatives for his efforts to promote patriotic education and for his writings on the American

Revolution.

Commander Lampman is the recipient of three national awards: The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution *Founder's Medal*, the Ellen Hardin Walworth Medal for Patriotism for 1999; the Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge *George Washington Honor Medal* for 2001; and the Daughters of Colonial Wars award for the preservation of colonial history.

Commander Lampman has been awarded several SAR medals and awards: Patriot, Distinguished Service, Meritorious Service (twice), Silver and Bronze Good Citizenship, War Service, Gold/Silver/Bronze/Amity color guard medals, and the Veterans medal. In 2006, he was awarded the NSSAR Minuteman award, its highest award, for his work at the national level.

MEMORIAL DAY SERVICE

Several services were attended by members of our chapter back in May.

On May 26(Friday) Jim Blauer attended the services held at his alma mater, Newport Harbor High School in Newport Beach. This service is held to remember those alumni who gave the ultimate sacrifice. There is a plaque at the base of the WWII monument flagpole that lists the names of those who died in the service of our country. This service which began about 5 years ago has gradually grown to include students, veterans, alumni and members of the community. Now if we could only get a color guard to present and raise the colors, that would be neat.

JULY 4TH PARADE

For our nineteenth straight year the Orange County Chapter participated in the Huntington Beach July 4th Parade.

This year Jim Blauer and Dave Manning were joined by Lou and Karen Carlson and Carlos Ramirez. Jim and Karen carried the banner. They were followed by Dave Manning and his 1931 Model A Deluxe Coupe. Following Dave was Carlos Ramirez and his 2004 Chrysler convertible with Lou Carlson riding with him.

The parade was broadcast that afternoon on channel 50(KOCE). It was then rebroadcast on both HBTv-3 and Time Warner Channel 6 during the month. There were 28 more broadcasts during July on these two channels. This resulted in 145 points just for publicity on television for our monthly activity report.

Carlos was new to our parade this year, but I am happy to report he is already making plans for next year.

COMPATRIOT VISITS HISTORIC SITES

While on vacation with his family, Compatriot Dan Henry visited several historical sites.

He visited the National Headquarters of our society in Louisville, Kentucky; the museum and only remaining block house at Fort Pitt where his ancestor Hezekiah Lindsey served; Valley Forge; the grave of his Rev. War ancestor Pvt Richard Spires of the 3rd Maryland Line; received a Private evening tour of Independence Hall in Philadelphia; visited Tun Tavern, the birthplace of the United States Marine Corps on November 10, 1775; the graves of five signers of the Declaration of Independence, including Benjamin Franklin's; Washington Square where 2000 Revolutionary War prisoners are buried; New York City's St. Paul Cathedral where Washington went to pray following his inauguration as President in 1789; grave site of Alexander Hamilton; Zachary Taylor's grave; the Hermitage, home of Andrew Jackson; and the final home of George Rogers Clark.

3RD ANNUAL BARBECUE

THE UNITED STATES COAST GUARD

The United States Coast Guard is the oldest continuous maritime agency in our country. Its history is complicated as it is an amalgamation of five Federal agencies. The Revenue Cutter Service, the Lighthouse Service, the Steamboat Inspection Service, the Bureau of Navigation and the Lifesaving Service were originally independent of one another, yet had overlapping authority. They were moved around from one department of the

government to another, until finally they were all placed under the umbrella of the Coast Guard.

On August 7, 1789 all existing lighthouses built by the colonies were Federalized. Funds were appropriated for the lighthouses, beacons and buoys. Shuffled between the Treasury and Commerce Departments, lighthouses were transferred to the Coast Guard in 1939.

Lightships were used to guide those mariners through areas where a lighthouse was needed, but there was no place to place one. There have been over 120 Lightship Stations along our coasts. The first was placed in Chesapeake Bay in 1820.

The Law enforcement duties of the Coast Guard have been threefold. To ensure the tariffs are not avoided, protect shipping from Pirates and to intercept contraband.

Military readiness has been a part of the service from the beginning. As the oldest continuous seagoing service it has served in every war since the Constitution took effect in 1788.

The Navy had been disbanded from 1790 to 1798. Revenue Cutters were the only National

maritime service. During war the Coast Guard has been used to augment the Navy with men and cutters and to undertake special missions.

For over 180 years the Coast Guard has helped to protect the environment. A timber reserve was created for the Navy in 1822 and Congress authorized the President to "Use whatever force necessary to prevent the cutting of live-oak on public lands".

With the purchase of Alaska in 1867 the ecological responsibilities were expanded. Fur seals were being hunted to extinction. They would breed on the Pribilof Islands where they were slaughtered. Over 250,000 the first four years Alaska was under U.S. control. In 1870 Congress passed an act restricting the number allowed to be killed. In 1894 cutters were stationed to prevent raids on the rookeries. In 1908 cutters were given the authority to enforce all Alaskan game laws.

Search and Rescue is another role played by the Coast Guard. In 1831 Secretary of the Treasury ordered the cutter *Gallatin* to cruise the coast in search of persons in distress. This was the first time a government agency had been set to task specifically to search for those who might be in danger.

Preventive safety was first addressed in 1837 when the steamboat Pulaski exploded off North Carolina and 100 lives were lost. Congress passed an act "For the better security of the lives of passengers" This provided for commercial vessel inspection and provided for the installation of fire fighting and lifesaving equipment.

The many duties of the Coast Guard gives special meaning to their motto,

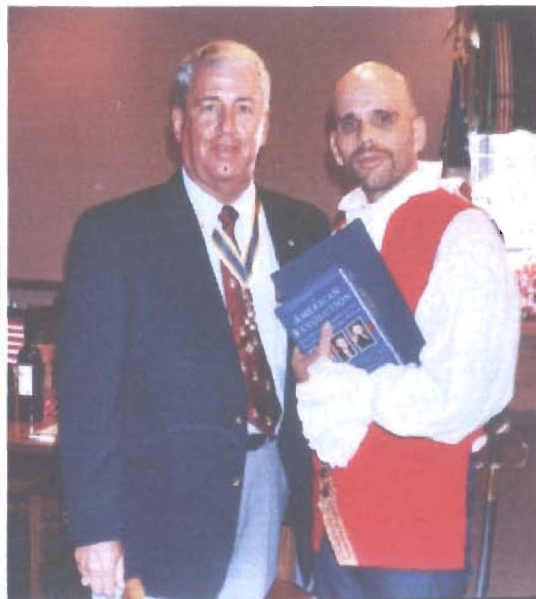
