CHAPTER ACTIVITY CONTEST

The chapter Activity Contest is divided into three sections; Small, medium and large chapters. Those from 0 to 40 members is small, 41-70 is medium and 71 or more is large. Your size is determined by the number of members you have as of January 1st of the year. Since we have less than 71 we are in the medium size chapter division.

The Redding Chapter had most guests and most publicity, The Redlands chapter had most New Members, Most Youth & Supplementals, and most CASSAR Programs, and the Riverside chapter took Most meetings, most joint meetings, and most publications. THE BANQUET


When we go to other meetings hosted by other chapters it is the norm to have a speaker. Orange County has preferred entertainment. In 1999, 2005 and again this year we had Paula Burton and her Celebrate America Spirit of America Singers.

Normally she would have brought all 35, but at the last minute our banquet room was changed and we found ourselves in a much smaller room. When informed of the drastic change Paula decided she would bring about half the group though it would be cramped. Even with the cramped space the kids were wonderful with the many patriotic and folk songs that they did along with choreography. Once again the group received a rousing ovation for their entertaining and patriotic performance.

The state honored Paula with the Silver Good Citizenship Medal & Certificate for her decades of work with kids and their performing all over the United States.

YANKEE DOODLE

"Yankee Doodle", a well known song of Revolutionary War times, was not a very complimentary phrase. People were not sure what was meant by it when it first appeared in print in 1775 in a London Broadside. The best explanation is that it is from the Dutch, who gave the name to

English Colonists: "Jans Kaas" or "Jan Kees".

Jan(yan) is the Dutch name for John. Kees means cheese. John Cheese was not meant as a compliment. Neither was "Doodle" which means fool.

The term "Yankee Doodle" first appeared in the London Broadside that was subtitled, "The Lexington March" in 1775. It was played by the British enroute to Lexington as they marched. It was a common practice of European Armies to play music when heading into battle. It was meant to cheer up the soldiers and give them courage. In this case it alerted the minutemen that the British were coming and their exact location.

Though the Americans knew it was a song that made fun of them, they took up the song with new words written by Harvard College student and minuteman Edward Bangs. They then proceeded to sing it right back at the British.

In the well known verse used by the British;
"Yankee Doodle went to town
Riding on a pony
Stuck a feather in his hat
And called it macaroni."

Macaroni is an 18th century term for a gentleman who wore exceedingly fancy clothes, that he thought of as the "Italian Style". His attempt to make himself look more important than he really was. A "Dandy". The British saw this as getting "all dressed up" and "putting on airs". It represents their foolish desire to be free from Great Britain.

The ten verses written by Edward Bangs, has him describing his impressions of a camp, noting the soldiers, captains and arms.

Some of the terms of the period are lost on us today. In the first verse, "Hasty Pudding" is a cornmeal mash that is quickly prepared. In verse three the term 'lasses refers to "molasses". In verse four a "Swamping Gun" is a large cannon. In verse eight, "Tarnal Proud" means extremely proud. In verse nine, the phrase "He set the World along in rows" means Washington lined up his troops. In verse ten, "Taring" was a word like "very" and "Pockily" meant "very much".

The verses are as follows;

Fath'r and I went down to camp,
 Along with Captain Gooding.
 And there we saw the men and boys,
 As thick as hasty pudding.

Chorus:

Yankee Doodle Keep it up,
Yankee Doodle Dandy.
Mind the music and the step,
And with the girls be handy.

- And there we see a thousand men,
 As rich as Squire David.

 And what they wasted every day,
 I wished I could have saved. Chorus
- The 'lasses they eat every day, Would keep a horse a Winter.

They have as much that I'll be bound,
They eat it when they 're a mind to. Chorus

- And there we see a swamping gun,
 Large as a log of maple,
 Upon a deuced little cart,
 A load of father's cattle. Chorus
- And every time they shoot it off,
 It takes a horn of powder,
 It makes a noise like father's gun,
 Only a nation louder. Chorus
- 6. And Captain Davis had a gun, He kind of clapped his hand on't. And stuck a crooked stabbing iron, Upon the little end on't. Chorus
- 7. I see a little barrel, too,
 The heads were made of leather.
 They knocked upon with little clubs,
 And called the folks together. Chorus
- .8. And there was Captain Washington, And gentle folks about him; They say he's grown a tarnal proud, He will not ride without them. Chorus
- He got him on his meeting-clothes,
 Upon a slapping stallion,
 He set the World along in rows,
 In hundreds and in millions. Chorus
- 10. The Flaming ribbons in his hat,
 They looked so taring fine, ah,
 I wanted pockily to get,
