With Armed Forces Day and Memorial Day commemorated in May its appropriate we will recognize another Purple Heart recipient at our May meeting.

The Orange County Chapter was well represented at the California Society's 135th Spring Meeting of the Membership in Sacramento, April 9-10. *The Embassy Suites – Riverfront Promenade was a beautiful venue for the meeting.*

In a moving ceremony the names of three Orange County Chapter Compatriots were read during the Memorial Service for Departed Compatriot Brethren; Floyd James 'Jim' Shadwick, Wesley James Fosdyck and George W. Turner. The name of Helen Davis; wife of Compatriot Walter Davis was also read. A few words were spoken and brief eulogies were given in honor of our Orange County Compatriots. Several of our own were elected to CASSAR statewide offices; John Dodd – Executive Vice President and James Blauer – Historian. Orange County Chapter member the Rev. Louis Carlson is now the Immediate Past President of the CASSAR with Wayne Griswold replacing him as president. Other Orange County Compatriots retained their CASSAR chairmanship positions; Kent Gregory – Medals and Awards, David Siler – Knight Essay Contest and yours truly – ROTC/JROTC. I was also asked and accepted the role of California Society Color Guard Commander and Chief of Protocol. #### CHARLES BEAL

Charles was born in Orange, CA. He grew up in Santa Ana and attended Santiago High School in Garden Grove. After graduating from high school, he served three years in the U.S. Army as a Military Policeman stationed at Ft. Dix, NJ and Mieasu, W. Germany. Upon discharge, he started attending Santa Ana College and was employed the County of Orange as a Deputy Sheriff for four years. He next worked for Security Pacific National Bank in their Corporate Security division until being laid-off due to budget cuts. Changing professions, he became a land surveyor, employed by the County of Orange for the past 21 years. He received his State Land Surveying license in 2006 and currently holds the position of Senior Land Surveyor in the Geodetic Control and Public Services for Geometrics/Land Information Systems Division. Charles has degrees from Santa Ana

College/Rancho Santiago College in Administration of Justice, Business Administration and Surveying & Mapping. He also holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from California State University, Fullerton in Criminal Justice.

Charles has been married to Diane for 24 years. They have one son, Douglas who is a junior in high school.

Charles currently holds 20 approved SAR lines. He is the recipient of the SAR Military Service, Law Enforcement and Bronze Citizenship Medals along with a SAR Certificate of Distinguished Service for his work in locating the Civil War Veteran graves of Orange County, California.

Charles has a power point presentation about his Orange County Civil War Veteran graves project. Locating and mapping the 801 known Civil War Veteran graves using his land surveying experience. He will include some brief highlights of Civil War Monuments at the local cemeteries and a few brief biographies of some of the Veterans. One will be on William Crandall the last surviving Orange County Civil War Union Veteran.

#### VETERAN'S CORNER

##### COLONEL GORDON RAY ROBERTS

Colonel Roberts was born in Middletown, Ohio in 1950. His hometown is Lebanon, Ohio. Now an Army officer, he was awarded the MOH while a sergeant for his "conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty" on July 11, 1969 as an infantryman with the 1st Battalion, 506th Infantry, 101st Airborne Division during the Vietnam War.

Gordon Roberts enlisted in the U.S. Army three days after graduating from high school, at age 17. Following basic training, he attended the Infantry school, and was then assigned to the 101st Airborne Division and sent to Vietnam.

By July 11, 1969, he had already distinguished himself, being awarded both the Silver Star and the Bronze Star. On that day, Roberts single-handedly wiped out four machine gun nests and carried several wounded soldiers from the field of battle saving the lives of many fellow soldiers.

The full MOH citation reads as follows:

**ROBERTS, GORDON R.**

Rank and organization: Sergeant (then Sp4c.), U.S. Army, Company B, 1st Battalion, 506th Infantry, 101st Airborne Division. Place and date: Thua Thien Province, Republic of Vietnam, 11 July 1969. Entered service at: Cincinnati, Ohio. Born: 14 June 1950, Middletown, Ohio.

**Citation:** For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty. Sgt. Roberts distinguished himself while serving as a rifleman in Company B, during combat operations. Sgt. Roberts' platoon was maneuvering along a ridge to attack heavily fortified enemy bunker positions which had pinned down an adjoining friendly company. As the platoon approached the enemy positions, it was suddenly pinned down by heavy automatic weapons and grenade fire from camouflaged enemy fortifications atop the overlooking hill. Seeing his platoon immobilized and in danger of failing in its mission, Sgt. Roberts crawled rapidly toward the closest enemy bunker. With complete disregard for his safety, he leaped to his feet and charged the bunker, firing as he ran. Despite the intense enemy fire directed at him, Sgt. Roberts silenced the 2-man bunker. Without hesitation, Sgt. Roberts continued his 1-man assault on a second bunker. As he neared the second bunker, a burst of enemy fire knocked his rifle from his hands. Sgt. Roberts picked up a rifle dropped by a comrade and continued his assault, silencing the bunker. He continued his charge against a third bunker and destroyed it with well-thrown hand grenades. Although Sgt. Roberts was now cut off from his platoon, he continued his assault against a fourth enemy emplacement. He fought through a heavy hail of fire to join elements of the adjoining company which had been pinned down by the enemy fire. Although continually exposed to hostile fire, he assisted in moving wounded personnel from exposed positions on the hilltop to an evacuation area before returning to his unit. By his gallant and selfless actions, Sgt. Roberts contributed directly to

saving the lives of his comrades and served as an inspiration to his fellow soldiers in the defeat of the enemy force. Sgt. Roberts' extraordinary heroism in action at the risk of his life were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the U.S. Army.

On March 2, 1971, he was awarded the Medal of Honor by President Richard M. Nixon for his actions on July 11, 1969.

United States Army Colonel Gordon Ray Roberts is the only Medal of Honor recipient still serving on active duty and as of September 2007 the youngest living Medal of Honor recipient. Colonel Roberts is presently serving as Brigade Commander for Walter Reed Army Medical Center.

#### YOUTH CORNER

The society has many youth activities in which we participate and have informed you about over the years. So far this year, your chapter has selected winners for the Knight Essay Contest, JROTC Contest, and the Americanism Poster Contest. We also have an Eagle Scout Scholarship Contest which comes in December. We have an entry in the Valley Forge Contest which winners will be announced soon. Presentation of awards for both the Knight Essay and Poster contest are coming up and will be reported on when they occur.

We have a new Contest this year. The Americanism Middle School Brochure Contest. As we have the Poster Contest for Elementary Schools, State Activities Chairman Tom Adams made this proposal first to our State Society who took it to National and had it approved by National.

**Challenge for School Year 2010-2011:** Here in California, it is the Society's intention to launch the program in the next school year, 2010-11. It turns out; American History is taught in the first month of a school year in many schools. Consequently, our challenge is to implement the Program in the Spring of this current school year 2009-10 to prepare teachers to offer the program in the following year. **Topic (Theme) of the Brochures:** The topic of the brochures will be determined by the NSSAR

Americanism Committee. The topic for the Brochures during the school year 2010-11 will be the same as the previous schools year(2009-10) for the Poster Contest. Specifically: The Battle of Bunker Hill. The thinking is that since the American Revolution is taught early in the school year(Fall), Chapters can use the promotional and teaching aides that were developed and used in the Spring SAR Poster Contest.

**8th Grade Teachers Needed to Pilot the Program!** CASSAR Chapters are encouraged to find 8th grade teachers who would be interested in inserting the Brochure Contest activity into their curriculum. Every effort is being made to lift the burden from the teachers in having to create additional instructional aides.

**Available Materials** include; SAR Brochure Guide, SAR Brochure Guide Scoring Form, SAR Brochure Guide Tally Form and Topic Presentations.

**8th Grade Teachers Training to be Piloted in April 2010:** In mid April in El Dorado County, a workshop will be conducted for interested teachers in the County, The findings will be available to all interested parties.

**Prizes will include;** State Winner to receive a \$600 Savings Bond, Runner up to receive a \$400 savings bond.

#### MEMORIAL DAY

We have three Memorial Day Events that our chapter members have participated in over the years.

The first will take place at Newport Harbor High School on Friday May 28. Here the students have for close to a decade put on an event to recognize the service and sacrifice made by their alumni. They list the names of those who gave their lives in the service of our country. For many years Compatriot Jim Blauer has been doing the National Anthem in his Revolutionary Uniform. The public is invited to join these students and teachers as they remember the sacrifice of these brave alumni. Starting time is 10:30am.

The other two are on Monday. There is the Ceremonies at the Old Santa Ana Cemetery off Santa Clara by the Civil War monument. Here our Color Guard presents our Colors and lays a wreath during the ceremonies. There is also the ceremonies at Fairhaven Memorial Park just across the way where our own Lou Carlsson presides during these ceremonies.

#### BETTY ZANE

Elizabeth "Betty" Zane was born on July 19, 1766, the youngest child and only daughter of William and Nancy (Nolan) Zane, in Moorefield Virginia. William was a Quaker from Philadelphia, but when he would not conform to their ways he was ousted and he moved to Virginia where all the children were born. Some say Betty was born in 1759. Most records say she was 16 when in 1782 she made the famous "Gunpowder Run". This would put her birth at 1766.

Betty received an education in Philadelphia after

which she returned to Wheeling, Virginia( in what would become West Virginia) where her five older brother lived. Wheeling was the largest settlement between Fort Pitt and Kentucky. During the American Revolution, the settlers were organized as a part of the Virginia Militia with one of Betty's brothers, Col. Ebenezer Zane, as its commander.

In 1774 just prior to the war, Betty, her family and a few other established Fort Henry. Originally called Fort Fincastle, it was renamed in honor of Patrick Henry. Part of the reason for this fort was because the area inwhich they had moved into was where a number of Native Americans lived and these settlers were actually in violation of a Royal Order which reserved land West of the Appalachians for the Native Americans. With the outbreak of the American Revolution the possibility of an attack on the settlers increased. Those tribes beyond the Appalachians wanted the British to not only put down the rebellion, but hope to expel the colonists and almost all these tribes allied themselves with the British.

Fort Henry was attacked several times during the war. In September 1777 fifteen patriots were killed and five were wounded. This was a considerable loss as the forts in those days were manned by only 15 to 20 local men and were supported by local settlers only when under attack.

Betty returned from her schooling in Pennsylvania in 1781 the year of the Yorktown victory. But the war was not over. a group of Native Americans had allied themselves with a group of British Canadian soldiers.

In 1782 Col. Ebenezer Zane wrote to Brigadier

General William Irvine, Commander of the Western Department, requesting "thirty to forty pounds of powder" as natives had been seen in the area and he was anticipating a battle. On September 11, 1782, Patriot John Lynn saw a large force estimated at 40 British Rangers and 250 Natives approaching Wheeling as he scouted along the banks of the Ohio River. Captain Boggs, the Commander of the Fort quickly left to get reinforcements and left Silas Zane one of Betty's brothers in charge of the fort. Betty and several other settlers were close to Fort Henry and made it safely there.

The British and Natives approached the fort and the leader a Captain Bradt demanded their unconditional surrender. This demand was met with a volley of fire that ripped through the British ranks and dispersed the Natives. The Natives tried rushing the fort but they were repelled. The defenders found that they were quickly running out of gunpowder and were in need of more or the fort would be lost. They needed to procure the gunpowder from the nearby Zane cabin. A couple of young men offered to fetch the powder, but were denied as they needed every fighting man at the fort and if they were killed it would have been a loss of valuable fighters.

Betty volunteered to retrieve the supplies. Some of the women tried to stop her, but she knew where it was located in the cabin as it had been buried and the enemy would not go after an unarmed woman. As the gates were opened she made a dash for the cabin some 60 yards away as the British and Natives looked on. It is reported that some of the natives were heard to have shouted "squaw, squaw".

Betty had prepared herself by stripping off the outer layer of her clothes to where she only had her chemise, petticoat and apron. Upon her safe arrival at the cabin she quickly went to work unburying the powder and putting it in her Apron and bundling it up. As she left the cabin the British and Natives realized Betty had 20-30 pounds of gunpowder and they opened fire. It took only 10 to 15 seconds for her to reach the fort safely with only some minor

damage to her petticoat from being fired upon.

Because of her daring "Gunpowder Run" the fort was able to hold its own and the next day having grown tired, the British and Natives departed. One small group attempted an attack on Rice's Fort some 15 mile to the north but the dozen or so defenders were able to hold the enemy off. It has been said that the Battle at Fort Henry was the final Battle of the American Revolution.

Following the war Betty married Ephraim McLaughlin in 1786. They had five daughters. After Ephraim's death she married Jacob Clark and had a son and daughter by him. Betty also had an illegitimate daughter Miriam Zane by Van Swearingen. By the late 1700s many of the Zane family moved across the Ohio River to Martin's Ferry in Ohio. Betty and Jacob obtained some property from her brother Ebenezer. Here they settled and on August 23, 1823 she passed away. She is buried in the Pioneer Section of Walnut Creek Cemetery in Martin's Ferry, Ohio.

In 1849 one of the last remaining eyewitnesses, 83 year old Lydia Boggs Shepherd Cruger swore out an affidavit that it was not Betty Zane but Molly Scott. But even Molly Scott had recalled watching Betty make the "Gunpowder Run". After reviewing many documents it was clear that Betty Zane made that "Gunpowder Run" during the siege of Fort Henry in 1782. In 1928 a statue memorializing Betty Zane was erected at the entrance to Walnut Grove Cemetery. It was paid for by money raised by local school children

She was featured in a 1975 National Geographic in "Women of the Revolution: Patriots in Petticoats."

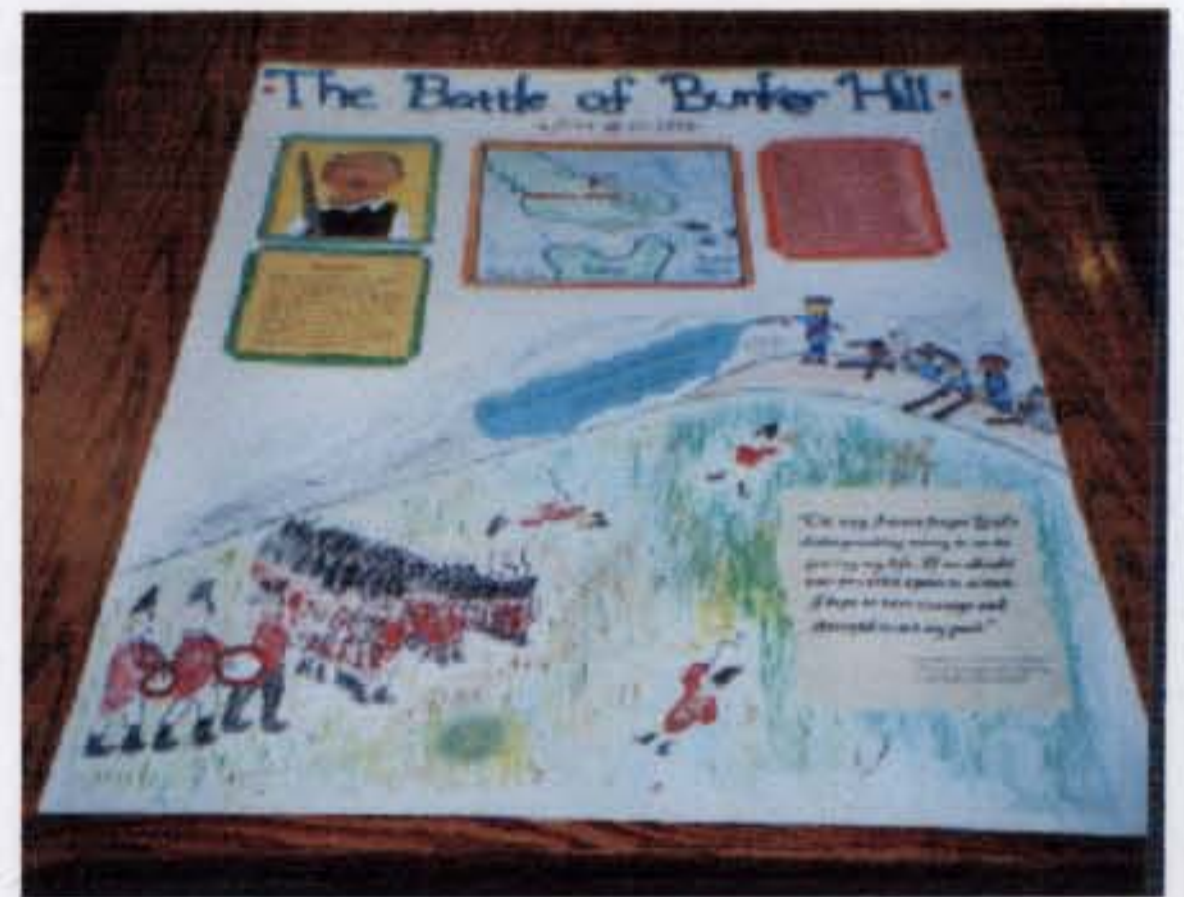
