If you served in the Armed Forces of the United States, received a discharge under conditions other than dishonorable, and you are a SAR Member in good standing, complete the Multi-Corps Survey Form, which is downloadable from www.VetCorps.Info. When done return it to the SAR Veterans Recognition Committee at VetCorps@sar.org. After being approved, a Certificate of Patriotism for your service to country will be signed by the President General and sent to your chapter, through the Secretary of your State Society. At an appropriate chapter, state or national meeting the Certificate of Patriotism will be presented to you.

WINNER REVEALED

A while back Vice-President General of the Western District, John Dodd, sent out a notice that the Northern Nevada Chapter of the SAR was trying to raise money for a fife and drum team to join their color guard. For this they were raffling off a bottle of whiskey that was produced at Mount Vernon from George Washington's own recipe.

Washington was one of the largest distilleries min the colonies and sold his whiskey throughout the colonies.

There were only 600 bottles that were produced in 2015. This bottle is numbered 182 and cost about \$200. The chapter sold tickets for \$50 each to raise funds for their project.

PATIENCE WRIGHT

Your editor has known of the name Patience Wright for years. That is because it is the name of the DAR chapter in Laguna Beach and they are seen each year in the Patriot's Day Parade in March. So, who is Patience Wright? Patience Lovell was born in 1725 on Long Island to well to do Quakers, John Lovell and Patience Townsend. She was one of ten children, but only she and her sister



Rachel showed artistic talents. At age four her family moved to Bordentown, New Jersey. At an early age she found she had a talent for sculpting and along with her sisters would shape wet flour or clay and paint them using plant extracts.

In 1748 she married Joseph Wright, an elderly Quaker Farmer. An elderly landowner, he spent much of his time away tending to his many properties. They had three children.

With Joseph away so much Patience found amusement in taking putty and bread dough and molding faces with her children.

When her husband died in 1769 she was left with children, five, aged from young adult to one still in the womb. As she was in need of money to support her children, she was encouraged by her neighbor Francis Hopkinson, who signed the Declaration of Independence, to make her sculpting pastime a source of income and livelihood.

She began by molding portrait busts in wax, a technique which she invented. She developed a reputation for her talent and did busts of well known figures of her time. These she would take on a traveling exhibit of her work. Her work has been recorded as the earliest attempts of sculptural expression in the Colonies.

Customers would have to sit for hours as she sculpted their busts. Her works were displayed in Philadelphia and New York and these showings help to spread the word on her talent which was soon in great demand.

In 1772, with few prospects here in the colo-

nies, she moved to England, settling in London which had a large population from which to obtain customers for her craft. Benjamin Franklin introduced her to London Society. She did busts of actors, politicians, nobles, and various prominent people for which she created an exhibit. She even did ones for King George III and Queen Charlotte.

Patience wright was well known and sought out by many, so her fame was well known by the time the American Revolution began in 1775.

In 1774 she began her service as a spy. She was an American through and through and supported the resistance to the crown. She would garner information from politicians and military personnel who came to her to have their busts done. She allowed them to talk about what they were doing both politically and militarily with the colonies as if it did not matter to her. She would relay this information to Americans in London and would also write to the Continental Congress with information.

As the war broke out she expanded her spying by using agents to get the information to Americans or British sympathizers in London. Due to her Quaker upbringing she used it to her advantage using words like "thee" instead of "you" and calling people by their first names. This included the King & Queen. They found her quaint and amusing , so they did not think anything of it and accepted her as such.

She spoke with people like Lord North, the Prime Minister, who was against colonial independence. Then there was Lord Chatham the previous Prime Minister who supported the colonists. Lord North spoke so freely about his plans during his sitting, which showed he was totally clueless to her spying for the Americans.

Her reports were usually very accurate, but on occasion the information she received and forwarded was for some reason incorrect. One such incident was when she learned that Lord Howe was sailing for New York when he was really headed to Boston.

In 1780 she went to Paris to open a museum, but found little opportunity for her talents there. While there she did do a bust for Benjamin Franklin.

Following the War in 1783 she wrote to General Washington expressing the hope that one day she might be able to do a bust of him. He wrote back he would be "proud" to sit for her if she should return to America. She never did. She did keep abreast of the happenings back home as well as the goings on in London.

Time was catching up with her though and she had to give up her wax modeling and was left to reading and writing letters.

Her last visit was to the American Embassy where she met and spoke with ambassador John Adams. Upon her return home from this visit she collapsed and died at the age of 61 on March 23, 1786. She had been planning that trip to the colonies to do Washington's bust. She left letters on her years as a spy so her contribution to the American Cause is well documented.

PASSING OF A COMPATRIOT

For many years now your editor has wondered what was happening with former chapter President Ed Hill. His email had stopped working several years ago, so your editor finally decided to write to Ed and see if he might be interested in returning to our meetings, if at all possible.

I received the following email from his family. Dear Jim,

Thank you for your letter inquiring after Ed and how to get in touch. I regret to inform you that after a brief illness Ed died about 5 years ago. I know he always enjoyed his time with the SAR and that it was something that was very important to him. I have good memories of attending many functions with him; 4th of July parades, awards dinners, and even a conference away near San Francisco. Please let those that may still remember him know that he thoroughly enjoyed his time with them and valued the work that the SAR does and values what it represents.

BOOKS ON THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

1) <u>George Washington's Secret Six</u> by Brian Kilmeade.

"This is my kind of history book. Get ready. Here's the action." —BRAD MELTZER, bestselling author of *The Fifth Assassin* and host of *Decoded*

When George Washington beat a hasty retreat from New York City in August 1776, many thought the American Revolution might soon be over. Instead, Washington rallied—thanks in large part to a little-known, top-



secret group called the Culper Spy Ring. He realized that he couldn't defeat the British with military might, so he recruited a sophisticated and deeply secretive intelligence network to infiltrate New York.

Drawing on extensive research, Brian Kilmeade and Don Yaeger have offered fascinating portraits of these spies: a reserved Quaker merchant, a tavern keeper, a brash young longshoreman, a curmudgeonly Long Island bachelor, a coffeehouse owner, and a mysterious woman. Long unrecognized, the secret six are finally receiving their due among the pantheon of American heroes.

2) 1776 by David McCullough

America's beloved and distinguished historian presents, in a book of breathtaking excitement, drama, and narrative force, the stirring story of the year of our nation's birth, 1776, interweaving, on both sides of the Atlantic, the actions and decisions that led



Great Britain to undertake a war against her rebellious colonial subjects and that placed America's survival in the hands of George Washington.

In this masterful book, David McCullough tells the intensely human story of those who marched with General George Washington in the year of the Declaration of Independence—when the whole American cause was riding on their success, without which all hope for independence would have been dashed and the noble ideals of the Declaration would have amounted to little more than words on paper.

Based on extensive research in both American and British archives, 1776 is a powerful drama written with extraordinary narrative vitality. It is the story of Americans in the ranks, men of every shape, size, and color, farmers, schoolteachers, shoemakers, no-accounts, and mere boys turned soldiers. And it is the story of the King's men, the British commander, William Howe, and his highly disciplined redcoats who looked on their rebel foes with contempt and fought with a valor too little known.

Written as a companion work to his celebrated biography of John Adams, David McCullough's *1776* is another landmark in the literature of American history.

3) John Adams by David McCullough

The Pulitzer Prize-winning, bestselling biography

of America's founding father and second president that was the basis for the acclaimed HBO series, brilliantly told by master historian David McCullough.



In this powerful, epic biography, David McCullough unfolds the adventurous life journey of John Adams, the brilliant, fiercely inde-

pendent, often irascible, always honest Yankee patriot who spared nothing in his zeal for the American Revolution; who rose to become the second president of the United States and saved the country from blundering into an unnecessary war; who was learned beyond all but a few and regarded by some as "out of his senses"; and whose marriage to the wise and valiant Abigail Adams is one of the moving love stories in American history.

This is history on a grand scale—a book about politics and war and social issues, but also about human nature, love, religious faith, virtue, ambition, friendship, and betrayal, and the far-reaching consequences of noble ideas. Above all, *John Adams* is an enthralling, often surprising story of one of the most important and fascinating Americans who ever lived.

Your editor was able to find these three books by googling "Books on the American Revolution". For those who wish to continue to expand their knowledge on the American Revolution and find some reading material, this would be a good starting point to find a book you might be interested in.
