PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings Compatriots,

A few weeks ago I attended a demonstration on new and old cloning techniques. A few days later I attended a DNA exchange and gathered new DNA to experiment with. While gathering DNA, I could not help but think of our Revolutionary War ancestors cloning in the 18th century. How was it done? What tools did they use? They must have been under a great amount of pressure to produce as many clones as they could before hostilities between the colonies and the King started. They knew it would take years before the clones would grow to be of any use to the cause.

Before you think I have gone around the twist (gone crazy) I must explain you may know cloning by a different name. I am referring to



Grafting. The Grafting of fruit trees to be exact. Yes, Grafting IS Cloning. The DNA I gathered was Scion wood. A Scion is a cutting from the mother tree. Grafting a scion to rootstock reproduces an exact genetic copy of the mother tree.

In the colonies such notables as George Washington and Thomas Jefferson had orchards. The apples and peaches from the many orchards would have been used to make cider, mobby and brandy. It would have been made to sell or given as rations to the troops. In the prerevolutionary war and revolutionary war agricultural economy produce meant wealth and survival. To grow large orchards with the best suited fruit for what was needed, grafting was the only answer. Growing trees by seed does not reproduce an exact copy of the mother tree. With enough root stock to graft on to, orchards can be grown quickly and survive.

I have been searching for many of these early fruit varieties and have only

found one so far, the Newtown Pippin Apple. Cultivated in 1759 at Queens County, New York, the Newtown Pippin was a favorite of Ben Franklin and Thomas Jefferson. Big deal you say, so what if it was why should I care? This apple is an exact clone from the mother tree in 1759. Imagine a piece of a tree that was cultivated hundreds of years ago growing in your backyard. The Newtown Pippin apple you eat today has the same flavor and characteristics that our founding fathers loved so much. Many of the era's heirloom varieties have gone out of favor giving way to new and improved varieties of fruit. They can still be found in fields and in the wild. I grafted my Newtown Pippin scion on to an Anna apple tree last year. It survived and currently has about 2 inches of growth. Not bad for the first year.

Compatriots we share a kinship with these early fruits as our ancestors survived and flourished with their help.

GEORGE WASHINGTON'S BIRTHDAY

Do you know when and where George Washington was born? Most people would say he was born in Virginia on February 22. That would be partially correct.

The fact is that the father of our country was born on February 11, 1732 in Westmoreland County, Virginia. Then why do we celebrate his birthday on February 22nd?

In 1732 the British were still on the old Julian Calendar. With the separation of the English Church from the papacy and the Roman Catholic Church, the British did not convert to the Gregorian Calendar created under the direction of Pope Gregory.

It was not until September of 1752 when the British finally converted to the Gregorian Calen-

dar.

They had to drop 11 days from the calendar to be in sync with the new Gregorian Calendar. So they went from September 3 to September 14th in 1752.

Following this conversion Washington considered the fact that had he been born on the continent or under the Gregorian Calendar he would have been born on the 22nd of February and not the 11th. With this in mind he decided that he would celebrate his birthday on the 22nd of February.

And that is why we celebrate his birthday on the 22nd of February.

The largest celebration of its kind in the western United States, 2019 will be the 37th annual celebration of George Washington's birth sponsored by the Sons of Liberty Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution! This upcoming event will be held at 3:00 PM, Sunday, February 17, 2019, at Hall of Liberty, Forest Lawn Hollywood Hills, 6300 Forest Lawn Drive, Los Angeles. All participants are requested to arrive at least an hour early.

Previous Massings of the Colors have been a great success. Over 600 people and fifty color guards participate each year, including over ten of our brother SAR Chapters. Many greater Los

Angeles area high school and college color guards take part in this celebration. If you would like to be part of this event, contact us for details on how you can participate.

Forest Lawn might initially seem a strange place for our event, but it offers an area that showcases a collection of American architecture and artworks that honor our country. There's the world's largest historical mosaic, The Birth of Liberty, a faithful reproduction of Boston's Old North Church, and larger-thanlife-sized bronze statues of Washington and Jefferson. You can watch a free 26-minute movie about the American Revolution as well.

BOY SCOUT MONTH

February is known as Boy Scout Month. It was on February 8, 1910 that the Boy Scouts of America was established.

Since 1989 under the leadership of President Jim Blauer (1988-1996) the Eagle Scout Program was begun in our chapter. This program is two-fold. The first is the Recognition of the achievement of an Eagle Scout by issuing a Certificate of Recognition to them. The second is the Eagle Scout Scholarship Program.

There is an application form that Eagles have to fill out that asks for the ways in which they have been involved in Scouting as well as their community. It also asks them to fill out a 4 generation pedigree chart and to do an essay on some aspect of the American Revolution.

Applications have to be in to Chairman Jim Blauer by November 1st so that he can arrange for the judging of all applications and have the application of the chapter winner sent to the state Chairman no later than December 1st.

This year's winner is Will Done and he will be at the meeting on February 9th to receive his chapter winning medal, participation patches and a check for \$100.

Prior to the presentation of the medal, patches and check he will read his essay on "Revolutionary Naval Engagements" to those in attendance.

I would like to encourage all of our members who are Eagle Scouts, (We have 14) to attend and after the presentation we can do a group photo of our Eagles with Eagle Scout Done who is from the class of 2016.

THE VIETNAM WALL

As part of the National tour, the Three Quarter Scale replica of The Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington D.C. will be arriving on April 8th (Monday) for set up and will open April 9th and finish on April 14th (Sunday). Bringing The Wall home to communities throughout our country allows the souls enshrined on the Memorial to exist once more among family and friends in the peace and comfort of familiar surroundings. The traveling exhibit provides thousands of veterans who have been unable to cope with the prospect of facing The Wall to find the strength and courage to do so within their own communities, thus allowing the healing process to begin. The main components of The Wall That Heals are The Wall replica and the mobile Education Center. The location is at this time being considered here in Costa Mesa. As soon as we have specifics on place and times we will publish them.

Last month in our article on the Vietnam Wall coming to Orange County I listed the women who were on the Wall. In this issue I want to remember the Chaplains who are on the Wall

There are 16 that are listed on the Wall. They are;

- 1) MAJ WILLIAM J BAR-RAGY While meeting with troops of the 101st Airborne Division on May 4, 1966, Army Chaplain Barragy was killed when the CH-47 he was riding in crashed due to mechanical failure. From
 - Waterloo, Iowa, he was serving the Roman Catholic Church.
- 2) LTC DON L BARTLEY With less than one month left in Vietnam, Army Chaplain Bartley

was assisting in the filming of a television program on Vietnam chaplains when he was killed after the explosion of a hostile mine. From Rockbridge Baths, Virginia, he




was serving the United Presbyterian Church at MACV headquarters.

3) LT ROBERT R
BRETT During the
siege of Khe Sanh, Navy
Chaplain Brett was
killed during an artillery
attack while caring for
the wounded on February 22, 1968. Assigned



to the 2nd Battalion, 26th Marine Division, Chaplain Brett served the Roman Catholic Church and was known to have provided up to ten masses per day.

4) CPT MERLE D BROWN
On Easter Sunday 1971, Army Chaplain Brown was calling upon soldiers of the 1st Battalion, 20th Infantry, AMERICAL Division when his helicopter was shot down by enemy fire. From Columbus, Ohio, Chaplain Brown



was serving the Lutheran Church.

5) LT VINCENT ROBERT
CAPODANNO While administering comfort and last rites to Marines, Navy
Chaplain Capodanno was wounded by small arms and mortar fire while serving with 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines. Advancing to aid a



wounded corpsman, he was killed by enemy fire in an act of heroism that would earn him the Medal of Honor. From Staten Island, N.Y., he is being beatified by the Roman Catholic Church.

6) LTC MEIR ENGEL A
veteran of World War II
and Korea, Army Chaplain
Engel died of a heart attack
shortly after admitting himself to a hospital in Saigon
on December 16, 1964.
Chaplain Engel was born in
Israel and immigrated to
the United States. Based at



MACV Headquarters, he served service members of the Jewish faith. He left behind two sons.


7) CPT WILLIAM N FEASTER

Army Chaplain Feaster was injured by artillery fire on September 18, 1966. Only after helping other wounded was it learned he had also been wounded. He died several weeks later of an infection. From Portsmouth, N.H., he served Congregational Chris-



tian Church while serving with the 196th LIB

8) LCDR WILLIAM J
GARRITY JR On October 26, 1966 in the Gulf
of Tonkin, a fire engulfed
the USS Oriskany killing
44 crewman and injuring
another 156. While attempting to provide last
rites and comfort to those



injured and dying, Chaplain Garrity was overwhelmed by the heat and smoke. He was from Havre, Mont. and was serving the

Roman Catholic Church.

9) MAJ AMBROSIO S.
GRANDEA While conducting a church service on May 25, 1967, Army Chaplain Grandea was wounded by a



hostile mortar round. Evacuated to Clark AFB in his native Philippines he died several days later from infection. He was serving the Methodist Church with the 1st Battalion, 14th Infantry.

10) MAJ ROGER W

HEINZ While serving the 5th Special Forces Group, Army Chaplain Heinz was killed when his helicopter crashed into a hillside in poor weather on December 9, 1969. From Coventry,



Conn., he was serving the Lutheran Church (Missouri Synod) and left behind a wife and two daughters.

11) CPT JAMES J L

JOHNSON As a passenger aboard a Navy VC-47 airplane on March 10, 1967, Army Chaplain Johnson died with 14 other service members when the wing failed during a flight. He was serving the



Baptist Church in the 4th Infantry Division.

12) MAJ ALOYSIUS P

MCGONIGAL On February 17, 1968, Army Chaplain McGonigal joined the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines in the final assault on the Citadel in Hue. While administering comfort and



last rites, he was killed by small arms fire. A former physics teacher from Washington, D.C. he was serving the Roman Cath-

olic Church.

13) CPT PHILLIP A NICHOLS

Known for his clean green uniforms and guitar playing, Army Chaplain Nichols was killed by an enemy booby trap while travelling between units in the field



on October 13, 1970. Serving the Assemblies of God Church, from Kalispell, Mont., he was attached to the 1st Battalion, 52nd Infantry, AMERICAL Division

14) CPT MICHAEL J


QUEALY Against the advice of leadership, Army Chaplain Quealy flew to a battle site near Saigon on November 8, 1966. While administering last rites and comforting the wounded, he was killed by enemy



machine gun fire. From New York, N.Y., he was serving the Roman Catholic Church with the 1st Infantry Division.

15) CPT MORTON H

SINGER Army Chaplain Singer had been in Vietnam for one month when killed while flying aboard a C-123 plane which crashed after takeoff en route to perform Chanukah services on December 17, 1968. From Flushing, N.Y., he



served service members of the Jewish faith and was attached to the XXIV Corps.

16) MAJ CHARLES J

WATTERS While assisting medics and providing spiritual assistance on November 19, 1967, Army Chaplain Watters was killed by fragmentation wounds. For his actions,



he posthumously received the Medal of Honor. From Berkeley Heights, N.J., he was serving the Roman Catholic Church with the 173rd Airborne Brigade. http://www.vvmf.org/userfiles/files/Chaplains%
