SPEAKER—COMPATRIOT JIM BLAUER

Our January Speaker will be Compatriot Jim Blauer. He will be enlightening us on the Activity Contest, how it is structured and how we as a chapter are able to get points that can lead to being named the Best Chapter in the State in our division.

Jim joined the SAR in 1981 with the help of his cousin in Santa Barbara. After 2 years in that chapter Jim asked the State Secretary, Carl Lamb, if there was a chapter here in Orange County as he was not able to get to meetings and become involved in the Santa Barbara chapter.

Jim was informed that there was an Orange County Chapter and that it met the second Saturday of each month at the Revere House in Tustin. Jim had his membership transferred to the Orange County Chapter and in February 1983 he and his mother attended the first luncheon. Jim was very impressed with this group of gentlemen and decided he wanted to be an active member, which he has done throughout the years.

He has served in many positions with the chapter which began in 1983 when he was made Historian/Archivist by then President Randy Ragsdale. A position he still holds to this day. Eventually Jim would go on to hold the offices of Secretary/Treasurer, Vice-President and became the longest serving president of the chapter from

1988-1996—8 years!!!

He has also served as Parade Chairman keeping our chapter active in the Laguna Beach Patriot's Day Parade and the Huntington Beach July 4th Parade.

In 1989 Compatriot Blauer learned the SAR had an Eagle Scout Recognition Program. He inquired about this program and found that Chapters could present a Certificate of Recognition to any scout who achieved the rank of Eagle Scout. Also there was an Eagle Scout Scholarship Contest where these young men could apply and be judged first at the chapter level. The chapter winner then proceeded to be judged on the State level. The State winner would have his application sent to National for judging at that level and vie for several thousand dollars in scholarship money for school (College).

By the Fall of 1989 Jim had started the Certificate of Recognition program. Keep in mind, when he started there were no computers. So, Jim had to decide how he was going to place the name of the Eagle Scout on the Certificate. Though he knew he had fairly good penmanship and could print reasonably well he thought it would not look professional enough. He then realized he could use his Calligraphy talent to do the certificates. Jim has been doing these certificates since the beginning in the Fall of 1989. As of the end of 2016, Jim had calligraphied over13,287 Eagle Certificates. When he started he was doing 200-300 per year. Now he is doing 600-700 per year.

President David Siler appointed Jim Commander of the Color Guard as for years Jim wore his uniforms in the parades. He was on many occasions the only one from the chapter to march in the parades or ride in the car he had arranged for.

It was President Walter Davis who made Jim the Chapter's Recording Secretary. At the first meeting which President Davis presided over, he called on Jim for a report of the minutes from the last meeting. Up to this time, Jim just took notes for his own information and was a bit shocked to be called upon for the minutes of the previous meeting. From that time on Jim has been doing the Recording Secretary's job of taking the minutes of both the General and Board Meetings.

In 1996 when newsletter editor Jim Shadwick was planning for his move to the office of State Secretary, Compatriot Shadwick announced that he no longer would have time to do the chapter newsletter and announced, unbeknownst to Compatriot Blauer, that he would be taking over as the newsletter editor—-Surprise!!! It was noted by Compatriot Shadwick that Compatriot Blauer had been supplying him with most of the information for the newsletter, so Compatriot Blauer seemed like the logical choice for this job.

In 2001 State Secretary, Jim Shadwick, asked Jim to become the State Registrar. Compatriot Shadwick informed Jim the State had been unable to locate someone to take on this job and explained the job to Jim and Jim agreed to serve on the State Board in this capacity. When the year was up and they asked him if he wanted to continue he told Travis Spears, the Nomination Chairman, that he would continue if there was no one out there who wanted to take on this job. When Jay Woods came forward asking to try his hand at this position, Jim agreed to step aside so someone else could get involved on the state level.

In 2003 the Fall Board of Managers Meeting was being held at the Los Angeles Athletic Club. Compatriot Rex Shannon had noted he was going to go to the Saturday meeting to see what it was like. Jim asked if it would be possible for him to go along. Rex told Jim he would be glad to have him ride along.

As usual Jim took notes of the proceedings. When he got home he decided he would type up his notes and make copies to take to the chapter meeting the next weekend. This so members of

the chapter could see what goes on at State Meetings and maybe encourage others to attend these meetings and become involved on the State level.

So, Jim handed out copies at the chapter meeting. Chapter Secretary Jim Shadwick sent a copy to then State Secretary Karl Jacobs who then proceeded to send a copy to then Executive Vice-President Stan Henderson. Stan would become state President in the Spring of 2004. Compatriot Henderson then contacted Jim Shadwick and asked him if he could get Compatriot Blauer to attend the State Meeting in Monterey in April as the State was having problems with the Life membership and Compatriot Henderson wanted someone there who could take good detailed notes of the meetings.

Compatriot Blauer was unsure as he had just changed jobs and was making less that before. Compatriot Shadwick informed Compatriot Blauer that he was going to be State Secretary again in 2004 and that he had a budget that would cover the expenses.

So Jim did it and also in the Fall of 2004. Then Compatriot Shadwick asked Compatriot Blauer if he would become State Historian. There would be no state photo albums involved only the taking of notes at the State Meetings. Compatriot Shadwick had recently discovered from the archives that prior to Carl Lamb being state Secretary and Historian for 20 years it was the Historian's Job to take the notes, not the Secretary. So, in April of 2005 Compatriot Blauer became the State Historian. He still holds that position to this day.

In 2013 Jim had heard about a group called Coupons to Troops. Here individuals or groups could collect coupons and they would be assigned a base on where to send them. The military are allowed to use coupons up to 6 months past expiration. So, Jim contacted the group and was assigned Fort Buchanan in Puerto Rico. This went well until 2014 in the Spring when two packages he had mailed were returned unexpectedly. He tried to contact Coupons to Troops, but was una-

ble to get any response. So he dropped this program. Then in the Summer of 2015 Jim received an email from Coupons to Military Families. They had taken over this program and had gotten Jim's email from the previous group. The chapter was assigned an air base in Misawa, Japan

In 2015 with only the last half of the year the chapter was able to send over \$42,000 worth of coupons to those serving on the air base in Misawa, Japan. This continued in 2016. With the amazing assistance of Mark Torres in collecting Coupons the chapter sent over \$300,000 dollars worth of coupons to Misawa Air Base!!!

So, Jim has been an active member of the chapter for all these years and should be able to answer any question on his talk about the Activity Contest which he has been chapter Chairman of since the 1990s when it was instituted.

MESSAGE FROM JOHN(JACK) MAN-NING

HISTORIAN GENERAL

Compatriots,

Happy New Year to all.

I am listing three Annual Awards two of which are awarded by the Historian General and one in which the HG is a judge along with the SAR Magazine Editor and the Chairman (Chairmen) of the Historic Sites and Celebrations Committee (s).

Please distribute among your Society mempers.

Colonel Stewart Boone McCarty Award

This award, first presented in 1996, is presented to the compatriot who has best furthered the preservation of United States History and its traditional teaching in our schools. The winner of this contest receives a monetary award.

Minnesota Society Stephen Taylor Award

This award, first authorized in 1979, is presented to the Compatriot who by research and writings has made a significant contribution to the preservation of the history of the American Revolutionary era and its patriots. The National Society Historian General determines the winner.

Thomas Jefferson Bond, Jr. Memorial Photographic Award

This award was created and funded by Wilma 'Sunni' M. Bond as a memorial to Thomas J. Bond, Jr. (1936-1997). The annual award shall recognize and reward the compatriot whose photographic entry is selected as the most representative of patriotism. The money given to NSSAR by Mrs. Bond is to be invested in such a manner as to yield at least \$1,000 annually in earnings, said earnings up to \$1,000 to be presented to the winner. If the earnings in any year are less than \$1,000, the award shall be given in increments of \$100 (i.e., \$900). Any excess earnings shall be added to the principal. An SAR certificate, appropriately embossed, shall accompany the award. Incidental administrative expenses, i.e., the cost of the certificate, may be deducted from earnings prior to any excess reverting to principal. Should the name of this award ever be changed by NSSAR, the original \$20,000 donation shall revert to the Bond Memorial Trust as of the date of any such name change.

Entries are to be no greater than 8½" x 11" in size, unmatted and unframed, and may be in color or black-and-white. Only one entry per compatriot will be accepted. Entries are to be sent to NSSAR Headquarters for judging during the Spring Leadership Meeting.

All photos to be considered must be received by the Executive Director no later than February 15 of each calendar year.

Judges shall be the SAR Magazine Editor, Historian General and the Chairman (Chairmen) of the Historic Sites and Celebrations Committee(s). If the latter is unavailable or if that committee is ever absorbed by some other entity, the other two shall select the individual(s) to serve as the third judge with preference being given to the chair of a committee devoted to patriotism. Judges will reach their decision in whatever manner they deem appropriate, so long as only one picture is selected as the winner. Announcement of the winner and presentation of the check and certificate will occur at Recognition Night during the Annual Congress each year.

The SAR Magazine Editor is requested to run a reproduction of the winning photo each year in the issue of the SAR Magazine in which Congress events are reported.

All entries become the property of the National Society Sons of the American Revolution and will not be returned. The award was first presented in 1998.




HAPPY ANNIVERSARY

The first two items show Independence Hall at Knott's Berry Farm and Walter Knott as the first recipient of an SAR chapter award. A Commendation for his "exemplary Americanism".

"We Descendants of the Heroes of the American Revolution who by their sacrifices established the United states of America, Reaffirm our faith in the principles of Liberty and our Constitutional Republic and solemnly pledge ourselves to defend them against every foe."



Here is an early picture of Independence Hall at Knott's Berry Farm. You will notice the two notes placed on the photo.

- 2. Located on the same grounds.

The chapter's original meeting place was at Knott's Berry Farm.

As your editor checked through Volume 1 he found they were still meeting their in 1970 during the third annual dinner meeting.

As you can see from the heading of the photo at right, this was in the Fullerton News Tribune, the Monday evening issue of April 17, 1967. That is just 2 days after our chapter was chartered by the National Society. Therefore this is probably the first award made by our chapter and to a man who had no qualms about showing his patriotism for our county, Walter Knott.






